## Strategy

Ballington's strategy for using federal funds is to increase low income and English Learner (EL) student performance in academic growth. Ballington has focused Title 1 monies on literacy and reading as a preventative measure. Ballington will provide federal funds to provide supplemental funding to the site, as it has a high percentage of low-income students. Another strategy Ballington employs is to provide college readiness opportunities and resources to low income families. Ballington will continue to provide tutoring and pull-out services to Tier 2 and Tier 3 low income, and EL students. The school will continue to implement a pyramid approach to Response to Intervention (RTI) approach. Ballington plans to continue the current plan of having strong newcomer supports along with targeted supports to prevent long-term English learners in later academic years and to continue to close the performance gap.

Ballington supplements reading intervention programs by offering after school tutoring and Instructional Aides to provide 1:1 support and intervention. The school will also continue to provide specialized pull-out curriculum using an evidence-based curriculum for our Tier 2 and Tier 3, low income, and EL students. Ballington implemented NWEA MAP benchmark assessments, which provides the data to identify Tier 3 low performing students. This allows for individualized, differentiated instruction.

Parents and family members are regularly involved in the CSI plan. Parents provided initial feedback and approved the initial plan via the SSC. Regular CSI meetings have been implemented to ensure parents and family members have an opportunity to provide feedback and approve direction of CSI plan as well as evaluate progress.

Ballington Academy recognizes the essential role of parents and their importance of their involvement and engagement in a student's academic success. One of Ballington's primary tenants is parents are the primary educator of their children and it is only in partnership between the school and the parent, academic success is fostered. family engagement in schools improves student achievement, reduces absenteeism, and restores parents' confidence in their children's education. Students with involved parents or other caregivers earn higher grades and test scores, have better social skills, and show improved behavior. To this end, Ballington has hired a parent involvement specialist whose primary function is to ensure parent engagement and involvement. One of the parent involvement specialist's initial primary roles was to develop a parent involvement policy in collaboration with parents. The policy was initially developed by a committee of parents that represented the school. Through various meetings, surveys, stakeholder focus groups, a policy was drafted. The policy then was vetted through the SSC and ELAC and ultimately presented and approved by the Board of Directors for Ballington Academy. Once approved, Ballington distributed the policy to all parents and then annually at the beginning of the school year. The policy is visibly posted on school bulletin boards and will be posted on the website once the website is updated. The policy is also shared and reviewed annually by the SSC and the ELAC. The policy is also provided to parents at annual open houses and "Back to School" nights. To ensure parents have access to understanding the State's complex system, Ballington hosts regular "parent academies" where parents are invited back to school in the evenings (to accommodate parent's schedules) to attend various workshops on school related subjects such as the newly implemented California Dashboard, Common Core Standards, the assessment and testing system, and Ballington's internal benchmark assessment, NWEA's MAP. Parents are provided regular parent teacher conferences whereby assessment, test scores, and student progress are shared with parents and goals are mutually established. These are presented in multiple languages. Teachers also enhance communication in between meetings via the use of electronic communication applications such as class Dojo. Ballington provides parents with ongoing materials and information via handouts at workshops, information on the parent boards, at meetings, and on the website. Ballington encourages the parents to support their children's academic success and shares access to several links and electronic applications that afford the parent to tap into the educational tools used in the classroom at home with their children. Ballington also posts several materials on the school's website. Via staff meetings and ongoing professional development, Ballington emphasizes the role and importance of parents with their instructional team. There are opportunities for parent volunteers in the classroom and teachers coordinate classroom parent groups. The parent involvement specialist spearheads the training with teachers on parent involvement and leads discussion groups with teachers to identify strategies for increased parent involvement. Teachers also attend and sit on the SSC. Ballington, as part of a parent organization, that operates public preschools, has established a formal MOU with the parent company to ensure a solid linkage. Furthermore, a preschool is co-located with the Ballington to further allow for collaboration. All materials are provided in multiple languages and Ballington offers assistance to parents with special needs to ensure all parents have access, are engaged and can participate in the success of their child. The parent involvement specialist is responsible for the assurance that all materials are understood by parents.

Ballington offers a comprehensive educational program where students receive access to a well-rounded academic experience. Ballington's staff are trained in trauma informed care that supports children struggling with social emotional challenges. Ballington also provides specialized instruction individualized based on students' assessment through the development of a learning pathway. Often Ballington secures academic experts to work with students in pull out groups to specifically support advancement in a particular standard.

Ballington uses a response to intervention model whereby instruction is tiered based on needs of students. Ballington administers the NWEA MAP assessment three times a year. Based on the assessment findings, Ballington defines tiers based on needs. The NWEA MAP assessment is then linked to a computer adapted program ( Ingenuity) that maps out an individualized learning plan for each student based on assessment scores. the program includes a well-rounded focus on the integration of all subject areas to include ELA, and STEAM. Curricula used is evidence based and includes Engage New York, and Fontes and Fennel. Students participate and learn the techniques of AVID and Kagan. Professional development focuses on project based learning, engagement strategies (Kagan) , AVID, NWEA Data Analysis, and Response to Intervention techniques. In addition, students have access to several pull out opportunities facilitated by credentialed teachers in the area of ELA, EL, and Math.

Ballington identifies needs for assistance via the NWEA MAP assessment system. The NWEA MAP is administered multiple times throughout the year which allows for teachers to develop individualized learning plans for each student and track progress.

Ballington works closely with parents to develop an individualized plan to support children who are homeless. Once enrolled, the parent involvement specialist meets with each family to develop an initial plan that identifies specific needs of the family. The parent involvement specialist provides linkages and referrals to community resources and serves as the conduit between the family and the resource. The parent involvement specialist serves as a case manager for the family and develops contingency plans with the families in a collaborative process to support families and the children's success. The parent involvement specialist tracks attendance and provides interventions should attendance begin to wane.

Ballington has implemented a comprehensive professional development platform for both teachers and principals. Identification for teacher's professional development needs are ascertained through a plethora of data sources. These data sources include a teacher evaluation that is based on teacher expectations around standards such as instructional delivery, planning, and student achievement as well as a section on teacher/principal agreed upon goals; teacher surveys; parent surveys; and student achievement data. Based on these sources of data, professional development sessions are planned, and professional learning communities are created. The school provides in house opportunities as well as external opportunities. In addition, the school provides access through monetary support to teacher induction programs and on-site mentor teachers. Annually teachers develop a professional growth plan with their principal that identifies professional goals. Through principal observation and review of student achievement data, adjustments to the professional growth opportunities are modified to align with results and course re-direct.

Principals receive a plethora of professional development opportunities including attendance at several conferences focused on leadership and academics. Plans are developed based on observation and formal annual evaluation. Observations, teacher and parent feedback, and student achievement data provide information on the effectiveness of training and the need for course corrections.

### **THIS ESSA PROVISION IS ADDRESSED BELOW:**

Ballington Academy developed its application in consultation with several key stakeholder groups. These groups included staff, parents, SSC, parent advisory committees, and the Board of Directors. Feedback was gleaned from these key stakeholder groups via multiple forms of feedbacks. Ascertaining input included participation at several different venues which included presentation on approaches and opportunities for input. In addition to face to face brainstorming, focus groups, and input meetings, written surveys were provided in multiple languages. Feedback and input was synthesized and incorporated into the plan. The final plan was approved by the Board of Directors. Ballington is the recipient of CSI funds and thus conducted an intense needs assessment survey for the program in addition to seeing input and analysis for the LCAP. Analysis demonstrated a need for enhanced student engagement and involvement. Ballington Academy has developed benchmarks based on academic progress. These objectives include individualized specific goals for each academic area for each student that are based on individualized benchmark testing. The ultimate goal is mastery and demonstration of growth. Growth towards each goal is evaluated on a regular basis via benchmark testing. NWEA MAP is used to measure progress. Data from benchmark is evaluated on a regular basis and used to inform instruction and update goals and objectives.
